2021

2021 was a year of growth for ADC. Despite the limitations imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic, we continued to raise our voice advocating for civil and human rights, the enhancement of democracy and the expansion of the scope of rights for all people. This development led us to increase our professional and research staff, adding value to our daily work, and we deepened our ties with other organizations at the domestic, regional, and international levels.

One of the main issues that we tackled was surveillance technology, including facial recognition, cyber-patrolling, and personal data protection. This gave rise to publications and activities that served as contributions to the Argentinian and Latin American governments, as well as an information bank for all citizens.

As an organization based in Argentina, we demanded a response from the authorities on the advance of cyber-patrolling systems throughout the country and the massive data leak in the RENAPER (National Registry of Persons) that occurred at the end of the year. In addition, we were one of the first organizations to express concern about the use of personal information in pandemic management applications, both at national and provincial levels. Our lookout for the proper use of digital technology and the respect for users' rights was one of the guiding principles we strived for throughout the year.

These actions were not done in isolation, but as part of joint initiatives involving public, private, and non-profit actors, aiming to attain a fairer and more equitable society. Our contribution to the struggle for

preventing and eradicating discrimination and hate speech in social media and gender-based digital violence was key in the draft of official documents at government level.

In the international scene, ADC continues to position itself as a key organization in the defense of civil and human rights and their impact on the digital agenda. During 2021, we participated in the Digital Trade Alliance (DTA), a global coalition promoting a pro-user/consumer agenda in digital trade discussions; the Digital Economy Committee of the OECD (Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development), as members of the CSISAC (Civil Society Information Society Advisory Council); and the digitalization working group of the C-20, a G-20 affinity group made up of non-governmental organizations. In addition, we conducted the Civil Society Forum of the RIPD (Ibero-American Data Protection Network) and were appointed as members of the Reference Panel of the GPA (Global Privacy Assembly), representing the AI Sur consortium.

This brief overview of the most significant milestones of 2021 is only part of the long road ADC has travelled since its creation in 1995. From the defense of human rights to its extension into a realm concerning us all, the digital sphere, we have placed ourselves at the forefront of the debates and controversies that are beginning to take place around the globe. Looking ahead to a new year, the growth of our organization and its national, regional, and international scope is what drives us to continue our pursuit in the defense of the most fundamental rights.

JANUARY

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- We took part in the Global Dialogue on Digital Hate, organized by NetGain Partnership, aiming to create ties between civil society actors from all countries, delve into models that could tackle and curb online hate, and facilitate interdisciplinary thinking and learning.

FEBRUARY

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- We released the *2020 Yearbook*, where we summarized the work carried out by our organization that year.
- We published *an article* giving first thoughts and warnings on the reform of the Organic Law of the Public Prosecutor's Office.

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- We participated in a consultation session with experts on UNICEF's "Towards a New Governance Regime for Children's Data. A manifesto", organized by the Alana

Institute, where we discussed the document's content and regional realities.

MARCH

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- Together with IFEXALC, *we expressed solidarity* with the Nicaraguan press and demanded the Nicaraguan government comply with its international obligations to protect freedom of speech.

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- We launched the Study Group "Child Protection in Latin America: debates from the perspectives of Brazil and Argentina" together with the Alana Institute and Data Privacy Brazil Research. The forum intends to expand upon the subject of children in the digital sphere through issues like privacy, data protection, the exercise of rights, and specific protection for children and adolescents. Activities will continue by drafting a joint report between the three organizations to be published in 2022.

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- We submitted **a contribution** to the report on disinformation by the Office of the United Nations Special Rapporteur for the Promotion and Protection of the Right to Freedom of Expression and Opinion. There we described certain trends observed in Argentina, such as the use of criminal law to punish the dissemination of information deemed false or the use of cyber-patrolling to monitor and detect disinformation cases.

- Our Executive Board and the Academic Council held their first meeting of the year.

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- We published **an article** with the ten most relevant news stories in defense of the right to privacy in Argentina. The compilation offers a review of the main challenges faced by the country in this matter.

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- We attended the IINNDI (Innovation + Development + Inclusion) seminar, organized

by Smart Live Talks, where we presented our guide *How to Implement Human Rights Due Diligence in Technology Development*. The cycle gathered experts from the private, public, and academic sectors to put forward case studies, innovative tools, and transformative technologies that improve accessibility and inclusion in all sectors of Latin American societies and cities.



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- We submitted **our comments** on the nominee to head the Agency for Access to Public Information (AAIP).

- We made a Request for Information to the Agency for Access to Public Information, on

cyber-patrolling and its current state in Argentinian legislation.

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- We launched a *Surveillance Map* with information on current developments and announcements on the use of facial recognition in Argentina through the microsite conmicarano.adc.org.ar. The page warns the public of the risks this surveillance technology poses and allows them to access reports on biometric technologies in Argentina and Latin America.

- As part of our campaign PUEDA - For an Accessible Digital Environment, we collaborated with the project “Fortalecimiento de la accesibilidad de la Linea 144”, seeking to improve the accessibility of the Ministry of Women, Gender and Diversity’s helpline for people with disabilities.

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- We spoke at the hearing for the designation of the new head

of the Agency for Access to Public Information (AAIP), where we shared *our comments on the appointed nominee*.

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- We participated in the monthly meeting of the Digital Trade Alliance (DTA). Since 2020, we have been part of this coalition, a global initiative that promotes a pro-user/consumer agenda in digital trade discussions.

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- We took part in an awareness-raising workshop on the theoretical categories of sexual diversity as part of the implementation of ADC’s Code of Conduct and Inclusion and Diversity Policy.

- We published the report *Privacy and Personal Data: A View from the Journalistic Perspective*, written by journalist Xavier Ibarreche. Through this document, we offer communicators some basic notions about privacy and personal data protection.

We also plan to issue a best practices guide for journalists and carry out a study on the challenges posed by the massive use of algorithms in decision-making and their impact on public life.



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- We published *Privacy is Health*, an initial review of the regulations and technological developments in electronic health records and telemedicine in Argentina, written by attorney Anastasia Dozo. The purpose of the document is to outline personal data protection norms concerning the use of ITC in medical care.



APRIL

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- Our Executive Board and the Academic Council held their monthly meeting.

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- We attended the meetings of the Digital Economy Committee of the OECD (Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development) as members of the Civil Society Information Society Advisory Council (CSISAC), where we presented our work on several topics, such as digital security and COVID-19, government

access to personal data handled by the private sector, and children in the digital sphere.

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- The National Court for Federal Administrative Disputes No. 3 upheld the **collective injunction** filed in August 2020 by people with disabilities and several organizations, including ADC, and ordered the Council of the Judiciary and the National Supreme Court of Justice to “adopt the necessary measures to make the Digital Portal of the National Judiciary accessible.”

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- Our executive director Valeria Milanes moderated the **panel “Artificial Intelligence in Latin America”** as coordinator of the Civil Society Forum of the Ibero-American Network for Data Protection (RIPD) within the conference “Innovation and Privacy - Data Protection in the face of technological disruption: cloud computing and artificial intelligence.” Other presentations were made by Marcelo Cabrol (Social Sector Manager, Inter-American

Development Bank), María Isabel Mejía (Senior Executive in Digital Government - CAF - Development Bank of Latin America, Colombia), and Aldo Luévano (CEO Roomie, Mexico).



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- Our Executive Director Valeria Milanes participated in the **“Latin American Launch of General Comment No. 25”**, organized by Alana. The document, published by the United Nations Committee on the Rights of the Child, defines how to apply the Convention on these rights in the digital sphere. The meeting was an opportunity to discuss its impact within the different realities of each Latin American country.

- We launched **PubliElectoral in Mexico**, together with the Office for Mexico and Central America of the organization Article 19, in view of the elections held on June 6, 2021. PubliElectoral is a technological social interest tool that collects political adverts in social media for their subsequent analysis.

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- We filed a pleading for unconstitutionality of the City of Buenos Aires Integral System of Public Security Law no. 6.339, which amends the previous Law 5.688 and gives way to the adoption of video surveillance systems. The norm does not meet the necessary standards of accuracy and propriety and

violates the constitutional principle of reasonableness.

- We published a **report on the PubliElectoral project**, examining the information collected during the campaign for the Chilean Constitutional Plebiscite of 2020.

- We participated in the monthly meeting of the Digital Trade Alliance (DTA).

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- We officially joined the C-20 Digitalization Working Group. C20 is a G-20 affinity group made up of non-governmental organizations (NGOs), which aims to address issues in depth and produce high-level documents that later compose the final communiqué to be delivered to member states during the Summit of the Civil Group 20.

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- **We filed an action against the Council of the Magistracy** for not complying with the gender quota in many of the

shortlists for judicial positions. The suit was a joint initiative together with Asociación Civil por la Igualdad y la Justicia (Civil Association for Equality and Justice – ACIJ), Fundación Mujeres en Igualdad (Women in Equality Foundation – MEI), Asociación de Abogadas Feministas de la Argentina (Feminist Lawyer Association of Argentina – ABOFEM), Fundación Poder Ciudadano (Citizen Power Foundation) and the Equipo Latinoamericano de Justicia y Género (Latin American Team for Justice and Gender – ELA).

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- We presented the guide on *How to Implement Human Rights Due Diligence in Technological Development* at the Show & Tell International Conference, organized by the Federación Argentina de Cooperativas de Trabajo de Tecnología, Innovación y Conocimiento (Argentinian Federation of Technology, Innovation and Knowledge Worker Cooperatives – FACTTIC). The publication aims at companies, SMEs, and

anyone dedicated to creating technology, especially those using personal data, and provides a simple series of steps to implement due diligence and human rights impact assessment.



- We took part in the panel “Improving the transparency of online platforms, an essential cornerstone for maintaining information as a common good,” within the Regional Forum for Latin America and the Caribbean organized by UNESCO as part of World Press Freedom Day.
- We contributed with information on Argentina for the release of the *AI Sur Observatory on Surveillance Technologies*

and Pandemics, a joint action of the AI Sur consortium member organizations.

MAY

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- ADC Executive Board and the Academic Council held their monthly meeting.

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- AI Sur - a consortium of which ADC is a member - demanded the **worldwide suspension** of the new terms of use and privacy policy adopted by WhatsApp, scheduled for May 15.

- Our Executive Director Valeria Milanes, also representing the AI Sur Consortium, was appointed member of the **Global Privacy Assembly (GPA) Reference Panel**.

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- We discussed the **new version of the 2nd additional protocol to the Budapest Convention on Cybercrime** with the Council of Europe.

- We requested the Access to Public Information Agency (AAIP), the Secretariat of Domestic Trade, and the National Bureau of Consumer Defense Protection **to look into** WhatsApp's new use and privacy policies and their entry into force.

- We discussed issues of interest to the C20 agenda and the Digitalization Working Group with authorities of the National Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Worship.

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- We participated in the Pre-SIF 2021 (Stockholm Internet Forum) and discussed issues about the Internet and Human Rights, together with civil society and governments. We also contributed on the topic of digital accessibility from a rights-based perspective, within our PUEDA - Por un Entorno Digital Accesible (For an Accessible Digital Environment) campaign.

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- We took part in the first meeting of the DALAT Community within our PUEDA

- For an Accessible Digital Environment campaign. We talked about digital accessibility and the pending issues within the region with leaders and organizations from all over Latin America.

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- We joined the event “Best practices in digital campaigns and social networks” organized by the Argentinian Electoral Court, as part of our PubliElectoral project. Representatives from IT companies, such as Facebook, Twitter, Tik Tok, WhatsApp, and Google, were also present at the two-day meeting.

- We attended the virtual meeting of the C-20 Digitalization Working Group and contributed to drawing up the policy package to be presented to the G-20.

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- We published the **second part of the report of PubliElectoral**, examining the information

collected during the campaign for the Chilean Constitutional Plebiscite of October 2020.



- We submitted **the document “Contribution to the development of a human rights agenda in the digital sphere in Mercosur”** at the 23rd Meeting of High-Level Authorities of the region (RAADH). The document details essential points regarding gender and digital inclusion, freedom of expression, and digital platforms and cybersecurity, among others.

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- We made a second Request for Information on cyber

patrolling, given that we were notified that the prevention protocol regulating the use of this type of software had expired on March 12, 2021.

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- More than two hundred people from all over the Americas attended the live webinar “La Accesibilidad Web Es Un Derecho” (Web Accessibility Is A Right), organized by the campaign PUEDA - For an Accessible Digital Environment. The event, attended by representatives of the public and private sectors, civil society, and academia from more than fifteen countries of the region, presented the project’s new website and the practical guide *Elaboración de productos accesibles en el entorno digital* (Creating accessible products in the digital sphere). The meeting included accessibility criteria: live subtitling in Spanish and interpretation in Argentinian sign language.

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- We attended the monthly meeting of the Digital Trade Alliance (DTA).

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- We agreed to support and contribute to a fairer and non-discriminatory digital environment with the City of Buenos Aires authorities, within the Human Rights and Cultural Diversity Secretariat meeting to prevent and eradicate the various forms of discrimination on the Internet and social media. The document was signed jointly with Observatorio Web, Chicos.Net, Fundación Participación 360 and Centro por la Justicia y el Derecho Internacional (Center for Justice and International Law – CEJIL),
- We signed an Agreement on Cooperation and Technical Assistance with the Province of Buenos Aires Public Defender’s Office to promote the application *Quiero Mis Datos, (I want my data)*, enabling its outreach and public knowledge throughout the province.

JUNE

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- We took part in **the third working group** organized by the Audiovisual Media's Office of the Public Defender, dedicated to tackling online gender-based violence. There we shared our preliminary considerations in order to clarify some of its concepts and distinguish terms.

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- We joined the **2021 edition of RightsCon**, an annual conference that brings experts together from around the world to address the challenges faced by human rights given the latest technological advances. More than 9,000 participants from 164 countries attended the event, divided into 527 sessions, and its program included the two issues which triggered the initiation of RightsCon, privacy and transparency, to which more recent – but not less important – ones were added, such as the rights of people with disabilities and public health.



- Our Executive Board and Academic Council held their monthly meeting.

- We signed **an open letter** calling for a global ban on biometric recognition technologies that enable mass and discriminatory surveillance, along with Access Now, Amnesty International, Internet Freedom Foundation (IFF), Instituto Brasileiro de Defesa do Consumidor (IDEC), EDRi (European Digital Rights), Human Rights Watch and more than 170 other human rights organizations.

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- We released a new installment of the **ADC en casa** (ADC at Home) series. In this delivery,

our guest, attorney and Business and Human Rights researcher Denisse Cufré, gives us an outline of the business and human rights international framework, especially concerning technological advances.

- We provided information and an analysis on the CuidAr application, implemented in Argentina during the pandemic, for the *Report Observatorio Covid-19* del Consorcio Al Sur: Un análisis crítico de las tecnologías desplegadas en América Latina contra la pandemia (AlSur Consortium Covid-19 Observatory: A Critical Analysis of the Technologies Deployed), issued within the 2021 edition of RightsCon.

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- We participated in RightsCon within our campaign PUEDA - Por un Entorno Digital Accesible (For an Accessible Digital Environment), and we conducted the Laboratorio Comunitario TICs accesibles: pensar entornos digitales en clave de accesibilidad (Accessible ICTs Community Lab:

thinking digital environments in terms of accessibility). Together with the organization Rinconcito Inclusivo, we discussed digital accessibility from a rights-based perspective, delved into the concepts of access, accessibility and usability, and shared best practices that enable all people to access and interact in digital environments.

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- We attended the C-20 Face to Face meeting, in which each Working Group outlined priorities and points of convergence for drawing up the policy package to be submitted to the G-20.

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- We joined the Advisory Council of the Public Defender's Accessibility Social Observatory as part of our campaign PUEDA. Its objective is to cooperate in the collection of qualitative and quantitative data and to devise an action plan for effectively implementing the accessibility tools established in Article 66 of the Law on Accessibility Services.

JULY

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- ADC's Executive Board and the Academic Council held their monthly meeting.

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- We presented the PUEDA campaign to Ford Foundation's digital rights grantee organizations in Latin America, and exchanged views on the challenges of digital accessibility throughout the region.

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- We examined the Chilean Constitutional Plebiscite via our **PubliElectoral** software tool, and pinpointed the issues voters deemed as most important: human rights, indigenous peoples, gender, environment, pensions, health and housing.

- We updated **PUEDA's website**. PUEDA is the ADC campaign that seeks to raise awareness of digital accessibility as a right for all people.

- Together with other civil society organizations, we

signed **an open letter** calling on stakeholders to halt the public bidding process of Cellebrite surveillance company until it proves to have taken the appropriate measures to respect human rights.

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- We released the document ***Protecting the Online Civic Space***, where we review the current threats to freedom of expression on the Internet. The report addresses four issues of growing concern in Argentina and the region.



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- We attended the kick-off meeting between the G20 Sherpas and C20 organizations, where the different working

groups presented their main concerns and the Italian presidency stated its priorities.

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- We started a new **PubliElectoral campaign**, detecting and analyzing political adverts posted on social media during the Primary, Open, Simultaneous and Mandatory (PASO) elections in Argentina.

- We published the report *The Gender and Diversity Approach to HR Due Diligence: A Key Factor for Technology Development*.

AUGUST

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- ADC's Executive Board and the Academic Council held their monthly meeting.

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- As part of the PUEDA campaign, we participated in the "Conversation on Digital Inclusion for People with Disabilities", organized by the Ford Foundation, where we

exchanged views on digital inclusion with organizations from different continents.

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- We sponsored **FemIT Conf 2021**, an Argentinean tech conference with a gender perspective organized by [LAS] de Sistemas.



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- Through our PUEDA campaign, we took part in the UNPRPD Joint Program Induction Training on Cross-cutting Approaches and Preconditions for Disability Inclusive Development. Together with other institutions from Argentina, we devised actions to foster the implementation of

the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities within the country.

- We helped to draw up the report *Made Abroad, Deployed at Home*, a study which exposes the increasing use of biometric surveillance technologies in Argentina, Brazil and Ecuador, unmasking the companies behind this type of software and disclosing government policies and actions that undermine people's rights. The report was coordinated by Access Now and received contributions from the Laboratory for Public Policy and the Internet (LAPIN) and LaLibre.net.



- As part of our commitment with the City of Buenos Aires

to support and contribute to a fairer digital environment, free from discrimination, our executive director, Valeria Milanes, gave a presentation in *Dialogando BA*, an online conversatory. The activity was jointly with the Human Rights and Cultural Pluralism Sub-secretariat of the City, Dialogando BA, the Institute of Political Training and Public Management, CEJIL (Centro por la Justicia y el Derecho Internacional), Chicos Net, the Web Observatory and Fundación Participación 360.

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- We attended the presentation of Ciudad Futuro - Plan Estratégico Inteligencia Artificial de la Ciudad Autónoma de Buenos Aires (Future City - Artificial Intelligence Strategic Plan for the City of Buenos Aires), for which we had made contributions during 2020.
- We welcomed the release of the *C-20 Policy Pack*, an alliance of more than 550 organizations – including ADC – who actively participate in

the dialogue with the G20. ADC furthered its contribution to the digital agenda.

- We presented the report *Protecting the Online Civic Space* before the National Senate Committee on IT, Media and Freedom of Expression.

- We published the article “Content moderation: lack of transparency in the censorship of bodies” in our microsite dedicated to the online civic space.

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- We published *Making Products Accessible in the Digital Environment: a Practical Guide*, developed within PUEDA. Through this manual, we intend to share the lessons, conclusions and accessibility tips gathered during our campaign advocating for the production of accessible digital content.
- As part of the activities of the PubliElectoral project, we took part in the “Virtual Academy for Monitoring Political

Corruption and the Abuse of State Resources during Electoral Processes” organized by the National Democratic Institute. The sessions were focused on developing strategies to identify, monitor and examine the misuse of public resources seeking electoral gain.

- In conjunction with Fundación Poder Ciudadano, we organized the conversatory, “Transparent campaigns: how and how much is spent on election advertising”.

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- In coalition with more than ninety civil society organizations, we requested Apple Inc. to abandon its plans to build surveillance capabilities into its iPhones, iPads and other products.

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- Together with other civil society organizations, we drafted a new legal brief demanding that the Legislative Branch take the necessary steps to appoint a National Public Defender. The request was made after twelve years

of vacancy in that position, and five after the Judiciary ruled that Congress is failing in its constitutional duty on not appointing a head to such office.

24

- We were interviewed to share our view on the UNESCO publication “Letting the sun shine in: Transparency and Accountability in the Digital Era”. The consultation is part of the global dialogue started by UNESCO to enhance the transparency of internet companies.
- We presented the PUEDA campaign in **the round of talks organized by NICA**, the Interdisciplinary Communication and Accessibility Nucleus of the University of the Republic of Uruguay. Together with the Disability Observatory of the University of Quilmes and the Tiflonexos Association, we addressed the topic of “Accessibility in Digital Media” and reaffirmed that digital accessibility is a right for everyone.

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- We were nominated for the **#GoodID award** in Privacy.
- We took part in the round-table talks convened by the Mozilla Foundation to discuss its Regrets Reporter browser extension and the main findings of its research on Youtube’s recommendation algorithms.
- We organized the **conversatory, “Political activity in social networks. The use of the digital sphere in times of elections”**, together with Fundación Democracia en Red.



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- Within the PUEDA campaign, we attended the **WebConf 2021**, convened by the Community

of Argentinean Developers (CoDeAr). We conducted a workshop aimed at addressing digital accessibility from a human rights perspective, reflecting on the importance of adopting accessibility standards in websites, applications and platforms.



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- We organized “Political activity in social networks. The use of digital space in election time”, an online discussion on the logic of political activity in social media, with particular emphasis on election campaigns. The activity was held in conjunction with Democracia en Red, and in it, we presented our PubliElectoral software tool, while Democracia

en Red presented their digital repository, “Politicxs en Twitter” (Politicians on Twitter).

SEPTEMBER

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- ADC’s Executive Board and the Academic Council held their monthly meeting.

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- Federal Contentious-Administrative Chamber No. 5 confirmed the **ruling at first instance** demanding the National Judiciary to guarantee accessibility to its Digital Portal for visually impaired persons.

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- Our Executive Director, Valeria Milanes, spoke at the **webinar “Impact Assessment on Personal Data Protection and Human Rights”**, held by DataPrivacy Brazil, where Rafael Zanatta (Data Privacy, Brazil), Bastián Riveros (Datos Protegidos, Chile), Andres Calvo (Spanish Data Protection Agency), Flavia Baladán

(Personal Data Regulatory and Control Authority of Uruguay) and Thiago Moraes (ANDP) also made presentations. The event is part of a cycle of talks conducted by the Ibero-American Data Protection Network (RIPD) Civil Society Forum (FSC).

- We contributed to the **online public consultation** “Stocktaking exercise of the OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises”.
- We released **the article “Gender-based political violence on the Internet: a problem that does not cease”**, in the blog of our microsite dedicated to the online civic space

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- We issued a press release expressing **our concern** about political information received by users of the Mi Argentina application. In it, we demand the appropriate use of citizens’ personal data and that Mi Argentina app respect its users’ rights.

- As part of the implementation of our Code of Conduct and Inclusion and Diversity Policy, we conducted internal training sessions on gender and diversity

- ADC spotted **an information leak in the province of Catamarca’s vaccination portal**. The flaw was discovered in the registration forms for the COVID-19 vaccine and the grant of entry to the province, which violates and endangers citizens’ personal data. As a result of this, we requested the Ministry of Health and the Secretary of Modernization of Catamarca to adopt the appropriate measures to correct these defects and protect its users’ sensitive information.

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- Together with the Asociación Civil por la Igualdad y la Justicia (Civil Association for Equality and Justice - ACIJ) and Poder Ciudadano, **we requested the Supreme Court** to admit amici curiae in the dispute over the current composition of the Magistracy Council. The petition

seeks to ensure an ample debate that includes the citizens' perspective on the impact this law has on the day-to-day functioning of the Judiciary.

- We began PubliElectoral's outreach campaign for the general elections, aiming to track and examine political advertising on social media.

23

- We took part in the **webinar "Democracy in Latin America. Technology and Democracy"**, organized by the University of Victoria (Canada).

- As part of the PUEDA campaign, **we held a virtual conversatory** that brought together representatives of government, the private sector and academia in a discussion on "Digital accessibility from a Latin American perspective - Challenges and experiences in regional terms". The event was moderated by Emiliano Naranjo, a referent in inclusive education and member of the PUEDA collaboration table; Juan

Pablo Salazar Hoyos, leader in transparency, Open State and Accessibility of the Ministry of IT and Communications of Colombia; Guillermo Paz, Front End Senior Expert at Mercado Libre, and Álvaro Besoain Saldaña, kinesiologist dedicated to participatory co-design processes at the University of Chile. The event met a wide array of accessibility standards, such as live subtitling and simultaneous interpretation of sign languages from Argentina, Chile and Colombia.

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- Together with more than twenty organizations, **we requested** that the Mexican government halt the implementation of its Cédula Única de Identidad Digital (Single Digital Identity Card – CUID), a mandatory document that intends to gather all citizens' biometric data in a centralized unit.
- We made **a presentation at Project 3 B-Tech**, held by the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, on the subjects of facial recognition in the City of Buenos Aires, access to remediation and the gender and diversity perspective in human rights due diligence.
- In conjunction with Centro por la Justicia y el Derecho Internacional (Center for Justice and International Law – CEJIL), we gave **a workshop** approaching the Internet from a gender perspective, and the different forms of violence and discrimination against women,

transgender persons and the LGTBIQ+ collective. The activity took place within the course titled “Commitment to a Fairer and Non-Discriminatory Digital Environment”, organized by the Institute of Political Training and Public Management of the City of Buenos Aires.



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- Within the PubliElectoral project, we released **a preliminary analysis** of the PASO election campaign in Argentina.

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- We spoke on a panel on The State of Mass Surveillance in Latin America at the **Code for All Summit 2021**. In it, we

presented the study “Made Abroad, Deployed at Home”, conducted jointly with Access Now, LAPIN and LaLibreTech.

- In partnership with the organization Derechos Digitales, we launched **a new edition of the PubliElectoral project** for the Chilean presidential election campaign.

- We submitted a Request for Public Information on the protection of personal data for women seeking induced abortion, contemplated by Law 27.610 (IVE – Voluntary Interruption of Pregnancy).

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- Together with other civil society organizations around the world, **we requested that the UN Human Rights Council** urgently condemn Pegasus spyware and start an investigation on human rights violations entailed by its sale, export and use.

- Together with the World Privacy Forum, we held a meeting in parallel with the C-20 Summit, “Enhancing New Opportunities for the Inclusion of Children and Women in a Digitalized World”, Our executive director, Valeria Milanes, spoke at the event, aimed at discussing the role of technology as a handy device for women and children to enjoy their civil, political, cultural, economic and social rights.



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- We presented PubliElectoral in the round of talks “Political Dialogues - Legislative Elections 2021”, organized by the Catholic University of Córdoba School of Political Science and International Relations.

In particular, we sought to raise awareness about the use of personal information by political parties during election campaigns, how it is collected for the COVID-19 vaccination programs, and the use it might be given by government and private companies, among other issues.

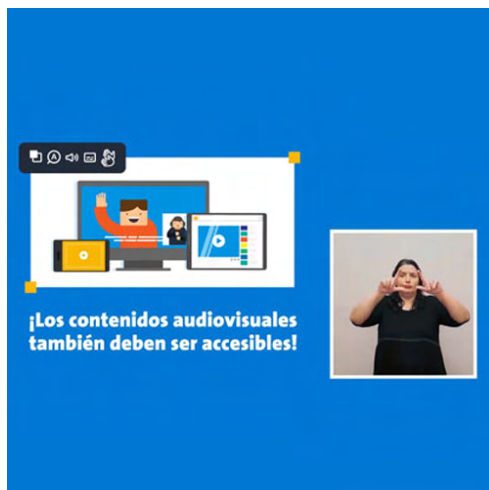

Communication and media

As a result of our continuous growth over the past few years, ADC has taken a step forward by creating its Strategic Communication Department and recruited new members to increase the outreach of the activities and studies we are conducting. Through this, we aim to enhance our place in the public eye and advocate for the defense of civil and human rights throughout the region.

Accordingly, we have expanded the information on our website (www.adc.org.ar), developed a communication strategy for social networks and deepened our links with the media in general.

Website

Our platform is intended to be an entry point for anyone wishing to learn about our activity, for which it boasts a great deal of useful information on our achievements and pursuits. Reports, research, accounts of our projects and opinion articles are some of the content that can be found on the website.

In order to keep the information updated in real time, we posted 54 articles and 8 reports written by ADC members throughout the year. In addition, we have added a new microsite about threats to the online civic space to the existing ones: espaciocivicoenlinea.adc.org.ar

Social Networks

ADC's social media presence was particularly visible on Twitter, Facebook, Instagram, and LinkedIn. In each of these platforms,

specific strategies were established in order to increase the number of our followers and promote regular interaction with them. Through the design of graphic pieces, we provided information about the different initiatives conducted by our organization, such as events, seminars, report launch events, and public positioning on issues of interest. We also implemented specific social media campaigns to spread information deemed relevant to the whole citizenry.

Thus, we ended 2021 with 10,085 followers on Twitter, 8,882 on Facebook, 705 on Instagram (our most newly opened account) and 705 on LinkedIn. Each of these accounts had similar growth rates to the previous year, which in turn led to a broader interaction with the general public.

Media

Over the last few years, we have maintained a steady increase in our participation in the media. In 2021, we appeared in 91 publications in different printed and digital pages as well as radio and television stations. Noteworthy among them are Chequeado and iProfesional digital sites, Télam agency, Clarín and Ámbito Financiero newspapers and TV Pública, A24 and Radio Nacional broadcasting stations.

Our relationship with the press sought not only to inform on ADC's activities, but also to place ourselves as expert advisors on numerous subjects, such as the Judicial Reform, the Law on Access to Public Information, establishment of the Internet as a public utility and the composition of the Magistracy Council, among many others.
